
Be Still and Know:

BROTHER JOHN MICHAEL LONGWORTH TO PREACH ON OCTOBER 6



In celebration of St.
Francis Day and the end of the Season of Creation, Brother John Michael Longworth, a resident of Rutland and a member of St.
Michael's Church in the Cloud, will be preaching

and leading the Adult Forum on Sunday, October 6. Br. John Michael Longworth, OEF is a life professed member of the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans.

This global community was born out of the profound sense of calling of Dale, a North Dakota United Church of Christ Minister, to Franciscan community, the helpfulness of the North Dakota Conference, the curiosity and creativity of the Third Order Society of Saint Francis and Society of Saint Francis (TSSF & SSF, two Anglican Franciscan communities), and the eager hopefulness of Dale's earliest companions, Chuck and Ron.

John Michael entered formation for community life in 2010 and made vows of life profession in 2014, celebrating 10 years of vowed life this June. John Michael has served as a community interviewer, compiling the first volume of OEF local ministries in 2013, as well as the Scribe for 3 years, and the Formation Coordinator for 6 years.

Franciscan spirituality is a rhythm of going from Gospel to Life and Life to Gospel, which Br. John Michael does through service to the unhoused community in Chittenden County Vermont, and as a Spiritual Director and Formation Companion. This work is sustained by a personal and corporate contemplative prayer practice that is always growing and evolving.

Sunday, October 6: "Walking The Little Way
Together: Treading Gently In Community" — In
this forum, our guest preacher, Brother John Michael
Longworth, will share stories from his 14 years of being
a member of the Order of Ecumenical Franciscans.

Sunday, October 13: "Swords to Plowshares" —
Parishioners Thomas Ely and Cliff Wood will lead a
discussion about Swords to Plowshares, a Vermont
and education to reduce gun violence and to promote
safe storage of firearms. Currently, the project is
Windham County-based, offering public awareness
and opportunities for people to responsibly dispose of
unwanted firearms by donating them for the process
of transformation into garden tools and works of art.
In these efforts, Swords to Plowshares is working
closely with the Windham County Sherriff's Office



and the Brattleboro Police Department and partnering with The Putney School, its students, and Brian Quarrier in their Art Department. Come hear more about Swords to Plowshares in Windham County and around the country.

Sunday October 20: "Stay Safe from Scam, Phishing and Other Internet Baddies" — This

Adult Forum, prompted by a recent phishing attempt to our church community, will be led by Annamarie Pluhar. She says "Over the years that I have been teaching older people how to manage their digital devices, I've seen many different kinds of attempts. I would like you to be safe, and able to recognize when hackers and other internet baddies have you in their target. There are some basic simple steps and methods that will protect you from these scams. I will show you how. Please come to the forum."

Sunday October 27: The Forum, led by Phillip Wilson, will focus on the title of Jonathan Haidt's book, Why Good People Are Divided by Politics and Religion? In this intense political time, we ask, "Where in the world is the other side coming from?" What if we learned that they are coming from the same basic place as our side?

REIMAGINING THE STRUCTURE OF OUTREACH MINISTRY AT ST. MICHAEL'S

In the early 2000s, the Reverend Thomas Brown charged a group of parishioners with the task of almsgiving (the act of donating money or goods to organizations in need, on behalf of St. Michael's) and organizing direct action to help those in need. The Outreach Committee determined some guidelines regarding the disbursement of money (giving equally to local, national and international organizations) and the expectation that at least one person from St. Michael's would be connected with the organization receiving funds.

The committee became known as the Mission & Outreach Committee under the spirited leadership of the Reverend Joel Hill, our deacon at the time. This committee was very active indeed! They organized mission trips to New Orleans, Rwanda and New Jersey (following Hurricane Sandy), hosted multiple fundraisers for important causes, and built relationships with people and organizations around the world.

The pandemic, however, put an end to many of the action-oriented ministries of the Mission & Outreach Committee. And as we were coming out of the pandemic, other significant, outward-looking ministries emerged. These include St. Michael's Refugee Ministry, St. Michael's expanded commitment to Loaves & Fishes and, most recently, the Skyberry House of Hospitality. While the Mission & Outreach Committee continued to disburse funds for St. Michael's and offered ways for our church to serve such as the Diaper Drive, colored envelopes for donations to aid those suffering from natural disasters and the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper fundraiser, there have been fewer people and less energy to support this particular configuration of ministry.

Brian Morgan, who stepped up to lead the Mission & Outreach Committee after Deacon Joel died in 2016, has continued to very ably lead this ministry these last 8 years and he is now ready to step down from this leadership position. Brian and I met to discuss the direction of the Mission & Outreach Committee, and



it was clear to both of us that it was time to reimagine this ministry in light of all the other kinds of outreach in which St. Michael's people currently participate. We then met with people who currently serve on the Mission & Outreach Committee; we remembered and gave thanks for all that the Committee has done over the many years, and we discussed the possibility of not continuing this ministry in its present form in order to discern where the Spirit is leading us in this moment. The Committee agreed with this new direction.

What's next? In the next weeks, several members of the Vestry and I will have a roundtable discussion with the leaders in each of our ministries that serve the wider community, including the Refugee Ministry, Loaves & Fishes, the Overflow Shelter Meals, the Prison Ministry, and the Tag Sale Ministry. Our first step will be conversation and communication between these different forms of outreach. How can we support one another? What are the needs of the outreach ministries in which we are already engaged? Brian and I are excited to explore new ways to organize and support outreach at St. Michael's. Please keep these conversations in your prayers. For the time being, St. Michael's Vestry will oversee the disbursement of charitable funds to organizations in need. May we discern the best way to serve our neighbors, near and far, at St. Michael's.



STAYING SAFE FROM SCAM, PHISHING AND OTHER INTERNET BADDIES

A text from Rev. Mary Lindquist almost got me. I went one step and then realized that it was a phishing attempt. How? When the text said "I'll reimburse you," alarm bells went off.

The internet allows us to do so much! We can have video calls with anyone around the world, shop for what can't be found locally, find old friends, track down important information, stay in touch with friends and family, share photos, get political news from independent writers, etc.

It's a pity that it also has a dark side. Hackers use it to inveigle money from innocent and trusting people. It's a cat-and-mouse game with the baddies finding evernew ways to scam and con unsuspecting people, while the various tech companies work to figure out how to keep their users safe.

Here are some basic things every computer user should do or know to stay safe.

- 1) Never give out your information to someone who calls you. They might say they are from Social Security, the IRS, the bank, or other entity. But how would you know that they are who they say they are? Hang up. If you are concerned that it might have been real, find a phone number for the entity on their website or in your bills and call that number.
- 2) Never respond to an alert, alarm, or other message that pops up on your device (desktop computer, laptop, tablet or smartphone) that scares you. Heightened emotion short-circuits rational thinking. Examples I've seen include "your storage is used up" or "you have been infected with a virus." Sometimes they even say "Don't close this page." But you should close the page, quit the program and/or turn off your device, and start again. Hackers are very good at scaring unsuspecting people.
- 3) Use unique, strong passwords for every account you have. This is REALLY HARD to do without the help of a computer program. Using the same password for all your accounts (or many of them) runs the risk that once hackers get one password that works, they will try it on other accounts. This is one of the ways that identity theft happens. I use a program called 1Password. There are others.
- 4) When your device prompts you to do the upgrade, do it. The upgrade will contain fixes to issues such as "security holes" that hackers have found and are using. Upgrades protect you from hackers.
