

And also with you.


Lift up your hearts.

BREAD AND WINE ARE SHARED

Invitation to Receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ. You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister. Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest. '

Following Communion, the congregation stands to say the final prayer:



Taize gets its name from the monastic community in the French village of Taize, which was founded in 1940 and served as a shelter for political refugees fleeing persecution during World War II. SOAKING PRAYER ON ELECTION DAY AT ST. MICHAEL'S: From 4 -7:15 pm on Election Day, November 5, the Healing Prayer Team at St. Michael's will offer three Soaking Prayer sessions in the sanctuary to support and strengthen our connection to God during this challenging time in our country. Consider soaking with God to bring calm into your interior.

What is Soaking Prayer?

Soaking Prayer is a Christian prayer practice of resting and relaxing in the presence of God. While soothing music plays in a softly lit room, participants are invited to sit or recline (bring a pillow) and become quiet and still, so quiet and still that an openness can be created for Father/Mother God and the Holy Spirit to be present with you. Prayer ministers slowly and prayerfully walk throughout the room, occasionally offering a reflective verse or thought to encourage resting and listening for the love of God.

Each session will last 30 minutes:

Session One: Arrive at 4:00 for a brief orientation in the Common Room before silently entering the sanctuary.

Session Two: Arrive at 5:15 for a brief orientation in the Common Room before silently entering the sanctuary.

Session Three: Arrive at 6:30 for a brief orientation in the Common Room before silently entering the sanctuary.
