ADULT FORUM: The Forum resumes next Sunday morning from 9-10 in the Meeting Room. All are welcome to join in.

- January 5, "The Iconography of Epiphany": The season of Epiphany has its own special imagery, connected to, but distinct from Christmas'. Every church and many homes have Christmas crèche displays with Mary, Joseph and the animals, and baby Jesus who makes his appearance on Christmas night. The three gift-giving visitors come from afar, and their camels draw ever nearer until they arrive on Epiphany. The images of the season are so much richer than just these. We'll see some of the images that surround the season, and discuss what the stories and images of the Epiphany tell us about who the three visitors were, how Christ's Good News spread in the world, and ultimately, how our experience of Epiphany illuminates the relationship between God and God's people. Led by David Treadwell.
- January 12, "Baptism: Roots and Wings": Baptism is the both the Church's ancient rite of initiation and a key theological construct for our understanding of ministry today. This Forum will explore the historical roots of Baptism and the ways in which our understanding of Baptism and Baptismal Ministry has evolved and informs our current understanding of the Ministry of All the Baptized. We will explore the current liturgy, and some of the ongoing, sometimes controversial, conversations about Baptism and expansion of the Baptismal Covenant. If you can, bring a Book of Common Prayer with you, along with your questions. Tom Ely leads.
