

NICENE CREED


Have mercy, Lord.

On the night he was betrayed, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread, and give it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Remembering now his work of redemption and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving, We celebrate Christ's death and resurrection as we await the day of his coming.

Therefore, O God, we who have been redeemed by Jesus Christ, and made a new people by water and the Spirit, now bring before you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ our Savior.

Sanctify us also, and let the grace of this Holy Communion make us one body, one spirit in Christ, that we

may worthily serve the world in his name.

Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.

God of our ancestors; Redeemer and Mother of Israel; God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ: Open our eyes to see your hand at work in the world about us. Deliver us from presumption of coming to this Table for solace only and not for strength; for pardon only and not for renewal.

BREAD AND WINE ARE SHARED

Invitation to Receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion

At St. Michael's, we believe that God's love is unconditional. We welcome all people and we affirm the worth, dignity, and gifts of every person as a beloved child of God. In our celebration of the Eucharist, there is no one here who is ineligible or unwelcome; no one who has too many doubts or too few beliefs. This is the table of a loving God set for all creation through the power of Jesus Christ.

You, who are part of that creation, are welcome.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available. If you would like either, please indicate that preference to the liturgical minister.

Receive the Bread in your open palm followed by the Common Cup, taking the cup by its base and guiding it to your lips. You may also receive the Bread only, with arms folded over your chest afterwards. Or if you wish to come to the Altar for a blessing only, please fold your arms over your chest.

FROM THE REFUGEE MINISTRY: Will you help welcome the Newest Vermonters?

On January 24th, ECDC received a stop work order affecting the Reception and Placement (R&P) services to refugees and their families which are normally delivered during the first 90 days. Funds which are provided during this period were also cut off. Then on Monday, January 27, ECDC let go nine employees.

As a result, our Refugee Ministry has been asked to back-up the staff that remains by providing volunteer support for 34 children and adults who are in this vital period of transition. The goal is to provide contact over the next several months so that they feel welcome and begin to adjust to Vermont during this very unsettling time. We need about 20 volunteers who will spend from 2 to 6 hours per week conversing, showing them the town, integrating them into our culture, and being the light they need.
